

YOUNG_ADULLLT aims at analyzing the interaction and complementarity of Lifelong Learning (LLL) policies and policy- making with other sectorial policies as well as understanding the different ways in which LLL policies are socially embedded in specific regional and local contexts across Europe.



METHODOLOGY

YOUNG_ADULLLT is a comparative research project that brings together a mix of quantitative and qualitative methods and modes of multilevel analysis including the viewpoints of different stakeholders.

The conceptual framework is based on three theoretical perspectives – Cultural Political Economy, Life Course Research and Governance Studies. The aim is to reconstruct the interplay between structural, institutional and individual levels.


